Notes to Catalogue 124

This is without doubt the most comprehensive catalogue of Churchill magazines ever produced.

This first section of the catalogue (nos 1-144) lists the four most important magazines (*Strand, Nash's Pall Mall, Cosmopolitan, and Collier's*) in that order with colour photos of the front covers, which are far more interesting than the titles of the Churchill articles within. Pages 1 and 2 describe each of the four titles and offer collections of each selected for the best condition.

The second section (nos. 146-210) lists all other periodicals with Churchill contributions from the common (LIFE) to the obscure (Answers), and everything in between. Woods reference numbers are used as the high price for the Cohen bibliography means that few collectors posses a set.

Most of these magazines came from a half dozen or so major collection that were formed in the 1950's and 60s. I lived in London from 1980-2006 and actively scoured bookshops, junkshops, and the few magazine dealers for these. The changing face of retail in Britain has eliminated most of the junk shops and magazine shops, and bookshops these days rarely stock magazine. I have also been on ebay for over 10 years, and have seen very few of these beyond the standards like LIFE and TIME. The older magazines are now extremely scarce, and it is worth noting that none of these big collections had complete sets of anything. There are many titles offered here which I have never before seen on the market anywhere at any price. This catalogue presents a unique opportunity to acquire some truly scarce material. For example, consider that in the past 15 years I have acquired 66 copies of the 1st edition of MALAKAND that sells for thousands, and in the same period have managed to find only one or two copies of some of the *Nash's Pall Mall* issues.

Condition **IMPORTANT**, please read this

I have not detailed the condition of individual magazines, except for individual issues of the Strand from 1924 or earlier. Please be aware that these are not hardcover books and do not hold up as well. They were intended to last for a week or a month. Almost all of the pre war titles suffer from edge wear and cracked spines. Rusty staples and browned paper are common. The 1960's and later magazines are better, but still usually not perfect. In those cases where I offer sets or runs, these are the best selected copies. In those cases where I have multiple copies, the first order gets the best condition. If you really want only exceptional copies, you may want to come out to Tucson with a suitcase full of cash and buy my reference collection.

Orders can be placed by phone, email, or post. Shipping is extra at cost, although most single issues will be sent within the US at no charge. Rest assured that our lovely packing department will do a good job.

The Big Four

There are four periodicals from the 1920s and 1930s which are the key to collecting Churchill articles and which published many of his best articles. Two of these ar London publications- The Strand and Nash's Pall Mall Magazine; and two are American- Cosmopolitan and Collier's. A rough count comes up with 130 articles from 1904 through 1939, with a few cases of duplication between publications. This is some of Churchill's best wroting, and these four publications are the core of any collection of Churchill's essays and articles. These magazines were also some of the premier litereary magazines of their times, and provide a fascinating insight into those times. Collections are listed first, followed by individual issues and bound volumes. Please note that the best copies are always offered in the collections.

STRAND Magazine This famous London literary journal began in 1891 and lasted until after the war. It is best known for the original appearance of many Sherlock Holmes story, and this has driven the prices for complete runs to five figure sums. Other well known contributors included P.G. Wodehouse, Rudyard Kipling, C.S. Lewis, H.G. Wells, George Orwell, and of course, Churchill. The issues as published had ads at front and rear on pages numbered in lower case roman numerals. These were removed when the contents were bound into bound volumes. The publishers supplied very attractive pale blue binding cases with the famous Strand design on them. Individual issues with ads and the pictorial covers are scarcer and more desirable, but the bound volumes are more durable and give six months worth of articles in one go.

Nash's Pall Mall This British magazine was similar in style and content to the American Cosmopolitan. With elegant artistic covers, short stories and articles by top writers, and lots of illustrations, this title was first class all the way. Churchill had a total of 32 articles in Nash's from February 1924- April 1930. This title is scarce even without Churchill content and there are no known sources for copies. Please note that Woods has muddled up the listing for 1924 issues. The January 1924 issue does not have a Churchill article, it is in February, and so on. My records indicate that in the past 10 years I have only made three purchases of this title, other than the large collections formed in the 1940s and 1950s by Wybrow, Hastings, Cloke, etc. In ten years of constant searching I have managed to buy exactly one individual issue from Ebay . Scarce does not begin to describe these.

3. A comprehensive collection of Churchill articles in Nash's. This consists of five bound volumes containing

the issues from February 1924 through December 1925. The rest of the issues are individual issues, most of which are held in a custom made blue cloth covered holder with gold titles on a black background. The issues for November 1927 and December 1929 are not present. I have looked for these for over 20 years now, and even my reference collection lacks the front cover for December 1929. This collection thus includes 30 articles by Churchill. Condition varies, some copies are worn with spine losses. \$2500.00


Cosmopolitan This is not even remotely like the current magazine with the same title. Before the war, Cosmopolitan was a sophisticated literary magazine, with stories by the best authors and covers painted by the best illustrators of the day such as Harrison Fisher and James Montgomery Flagg. There were a total of 19 Churchill contributions from 1924 through 1931, some of which are scarce and valuable. Magazine size 8.5 x 11.5 inches, with spine, usually about 200 pages, lots of great ads.

Collier's This National Weekly was very popular throughout the first half of the 20th Century attracting top class writes and srtists. Not a news magazine, the content was mostly stories, but essays and non fiction articles were popular. Churchill was a frequent contributor through much of the 1930's. There are a total of 42 Churchill articles from the 1930's. In addition, there was one more in 1947, an article in 1901 and 3 in 1916-17. Most of these magazines were consumed in the paper drives during the war, so now any of these old issues are difficult to find. Each issue about 11 x 14 inches.
