

# **Notes to Catalogue 145**

This is likely one of the world top ten Churchill collections. Each collector has his own objectives. The aim here was every edition of all of Churchill's works with as many dustjackets as possible. This catalogue is only the cream. I will follow with another catalogue listing a big selection of other books by Churchill; things like all the Macmillan printings form the 1940s, Heroes of History, or all the 2 volume sets of Marlborough.



I try to describe the flaws in the books and jackets, and picture the spines of everything. These old pre-1945 books are rarely in perfect condition. If you require perfect, you should consider coming out to Tucson.

1 The Story of the Malakand Field Force Longmans, Green & Co., London, 1898 The first printing of Churchill's first book, based on his exploits with The Malakand Field Force, led by Sir Bindon Blood, on the Northwest Frontier of India in 1897. Bound in apple green cloth with gilt titles. 336 pages plus catalogue at rear. 6 maps plus frontis portrait. No errata slip present, see discussions on this in all bibliographies. A clean crisp copy in original cloth. Binding is very tight and square, spine clean with bright gilt, only wear is some rubbing on the joints. Original black endpapers intact. Page edges spotted, but contents clean. The first blank leaf bears the signature of (Capt.) E W M Norie, Superintendent of Army Signalling, assigned HQ Staff of Malakand Field Force, mentioned in despatches twice by Sir Bindon Blood. There are pencil notations in the margins, most of which seem to refer to awards of individuals mentioned in the text. A

The Story of the Malakand Field Force Longmans, Green & Co., London, 1898 The first printing of Churchill's first book, based on his exploits with The Malakand Field Force, led by Sir Bindon Blood Original cloth has some faint marks on covers and the spine is lightly toned, but gilt still shiny. There is almost no wear at spine ends. Binding is very tight, page edges show some spots. Owner inscription dated April 1898, one month after publication. Scattered foxing in text, especially at the folding maps. No errata slip. The front hinge is cracked along 3 inches, rear

hinge undamaged. A nice unmolested copy, but not

3 The Story of the Malakand Field Force Longmans, Green & Co., London, 1898 The Colonial issue of

the first edition. This edition, intended for sale in India and the Colonies, used the same printing plates as the first home issue, so has all the same errors. This copy has been rebound in plain blue cloth with gilt titles on spine. There are no markings of any kind. It includes the 16 line Indian errata slip, see Cohen A.1.2c for discussion. The map at p. 146 has a rough edge from prior misfolding \$250.00

4 The Story of the Malakand Field Force Longmans, Green & Co., London, 1898 This is the 3rd printing of the Colonial edition, November 1898. This is a bibliographically

significant book, as this is the earliest dated appearance of the corrected text, also used in the Silver Library edition of 1899, which most believe to be the first correct text edition. Cohen A1.4.a, see Lamgworth p. 19. Original cloth is unmarked but dark blue printing well rubbed. The spine is toned and the gilt barely readable. Contents have no spots, but paper is toned overall. Plain endpapers are browned but intact. The map at page 1 has a split along the fold. \$1200.00



The Story of the Malakand Field Force Longmans, Green & Co., London, 1898 The Colonial issue of the first edition. It is bound in pictorial grey cloth. This edition, intended for sale in India and the Colonies, used the same printing plates as the first home issue, so has all the same errors. Latest estimates are that about 1100 of these were issued clothbound. The survival rate is low and most are in poor condition from the tropical climates in which they were sold. 336 pages, 6 maps, no catalogues at rear. Decorated cloth cover clean and readable, wear at corners and spine ends. Spine is toned and the gilt is very dull. Front endpaper appears to have been replaced. Contents tight and clean, foxing observed only at the folding map. Not perfect, but far better than most. \$1400.00

The Story of the Malakand Field Force Longmans, Green & Co., London, 1898 The Colonial issue of the first edition. Most copies seen are clothbound, but there was also a softcover edition with thin pale green covers printed in black. See Langworth p. 17. The survival rate of these flimsy copies in the far flung empire was extremely low. Both covers present, the rear is detached, the front held on with tape. Books is ex-library from the Auckland Institute. Some scattered spots, but contents generally clean. As bad as this is, it is better than most I have seen, a total of 3 copies seen. \$6000.00




7 The Story of the Malakand Field Force Longmans, Green & Co., London, 1899 Due to the large number of errors in the first edition, a new revised edition was quickly prepared and published January 1899 in Longmans

Silver Library series of low price titles. Bound in red brown cloth with gilt titles and Longmans ship logo on spine. This edition more attractive and durable than the first and important as it is the first setting with all the author's corrections. Original cloth binding has a small splash marks on covers, spine slightly sunned, but

still a strong shade with bright gilt. This 1899 printing normally has patterned endpapers, but these are plain, but definitely vintage originals \$850.00

The Story of the Malakand Field Force Longmans, Green & Co., London, Due to the large number of errors in the first edition, a new revised edition was quickly prepared and published January 1899 in Longmans Silver Library series of low price titles. This second printing of 1000 copies was done in 1901. There are several binding variants. See Langworth p. 22 for details. This copy bound in the smooth red cloth. The red is sunned on the spine and part of the front cover. For those interested, this copy matches the last line in my table on p. 22 in Langworth. There are two inscriptions and a bookplate on the endpaper. One is dated Rawal Pindi 1926, and another about years spent on the Malakand. \$450.00





The Story of the Malakand Field Force Longmans, Green & Co., London, 1901 Longmans Silver Library series of low price titles. This second printing of 1000 copies was done in 1901. There are several binding variants. See Langworth p. 22 for details. Bound in medium brown cloth, faint splash on front cover, binding tight, wear at spine ends, gilt bright. Has the ship endpapers, contents clean, no names. The first map has been detached but is present. \$600.00

The Story of the Malakand Field Force Thos.

Nelson & Son, London, 1916 A cheap edition produced during the first World War. A small book, 4 x 6.25 inches, bound in medium blue cloth, with small type, but retaining 6 maps, now all monochrome. Part of the Nelson Shilling Library of cheap books for the wartime market.

Binding firm, covers have a few small

marks, spine dull, contents clean. \$75.00



The River War (An Historical Account of the Reconquest of the Sudan) Longman's Green & Co., London, 1899. First edition 1st impression, published 1899 in 2 volumes. The best edition with coloured maps and illustrations not present in the abridged text versions issued later. One of 2000 sets produced. Bound in dark blue green (almost black) cloth, blocked with gilt decorations of the Mahdi's tomb and a gunboat. xxiii+462, xiv+ 499 pages, total of 57 illustrations, many especially drawn by Angus McNeill of the Seaforth Highlanders, 34 maps and plans many coloured and folding. Clean set in original cloth. Both volumes signed by the editor, Col. Rhodes on the front endpapers, but since this is a black surface, they are very difficult to see. Contents unusually clean and free of spots, no publishers catalogue, so perhaps originally sold in US. Vol. I has a small splash mark on front cover, gilt on spine clear



but not shiny, front free endpaper almost detached, rear on is detached but present. Vol. II has a vertical wrinkle in spine, both hinges fully split. \$4500.00




The River War. Longman's Green & Co., London, 1900 First edition 2nd impression 1900 in 2 volumes. The 2nd impression identical to the first in appearance and setting. Books have armorial bookplates on the front pastedown and gift inscriptions on the half title pages, scattered foxing throughout, less than most copies I see. Vol. I has a very faint splash mark on lower right corner of front cover, Vol. II has light rubbing on front cover, and a small gouge in the front joint, about 2 inches from the top. \$3200.00

The River War (An Historical Account of the Reconquest of the Sudan) Longmans Green & Co., London, 1902 Second edition, abridged into a single volume. As Churchill was now aspiring to politics, much of the criticism of Kitchener in the original has now been deleted. This edition has 22 maps, of which 14 are coloured in 3 colours. Bound in medium red cloth, blocked gilt with same images of a gunboat and the Mahdi's Tomb as the first edition, resulting in a highly attractive book. 381 pages, index, appendices. Scarcer than first edition, only 1000 copies issued. Book has clean covers, bright gilt, spine slightly sunned, but still a good red. There is a small black mark on the spine, a faint white mark on the front cover, some black marks and a faint circular stain on the rear cover. Page edges are off white with some spotting. Maps neatly folded, contents generally clean, but some foxing in first few pages. \$850.00



The River War Thomas Nelson & Sons, London, (1915)


A cheap edition produced during the first World War. A small book, 4 x 6.25 inches, bound in medium blue cloth, with small type, but retaining 16 maps, now all monochrome. Part of the Nelson Shilling Library of cheap books for the wartime market. Original blue cloth is clean on the covers, good strong blue on the spine with unusually bright gilt, contents generally clean, but a few spots noted. A superior copy with excellent shelf appearance. \$120.00



The River War Thomas Nelson & Sons, London, (1915)

A clean tight book with the very scarce dustwrapper. Book is crisp, unworn, covers unmarked, very shiny gilt on spine, endpapers tanned as always, contents very clean. Owner name date 1920 on endpaper. Dustwrapper is worn with losses along edges. The lower left portion of the rear panel has been replaced with a patch copied from another DJ. \$1500.00

The River War Eyre & Spottiswoode, London, 1933 Copyright page 17 identifies this as "first cheap edition", but actually it is the second, as there was also a really cheap little edition in 1915. There are 22 maps, many folding and some in two colours. Bound in lilac cloth,, blocked in black on the spine only, 381 pages, index, appendices. This edition adds a new introduction from Churchill. is clean with a firm binding, some minor rubbing on the spine and some wear on the bottom edges. Owner name on endpaper dated Feb 1933. Page edges even with some scattered spots. Contents clean with maps neatly folded. Dustwrapper is clean with good white spine, some edge wear and tears, and a small piece gone at base of





The River War Eyre & Spottiswoode, London, 1933. Original dark lilac cloth is clean 18 on covers, rub marks on spine, binding very tight, page edges off

white but not spotted. Contents clean except light spots on first few pages. \$100.00

The River War Eyre & Spottiswoode, London, 1933, 2nd 19 printing. Book is clean and crisp, spine is unmarked, unfaded. Owner name on endpaper date 1938 in Khartoum. Some light spots on otherwise clean even page edges. Includes the original dustwrapper

with same style as first printing. The jacket is well worn with tape marks along top of front cover and a large piece 55 x 40 mm gone from lower edge of front cover.



20The River War Eyre & Spottiswoode, London, 1940 This is the 3rd printing of this edition, and easily the scarcest of the 5 printings of this popular edition. Cohen reports only 1252 copies printed. The scarcity of this printing results in a premium and thus its appeal is primarily to completists. Similar in appearance to the 1933, the cloth is thinner and of different texture. Book is very crisp and unworn, with sharp corners showing only slight wear. Cloth has a good deep color,

Page edges even but off white, a single spot on foredges. Gift inscription dated 1941 on free endpaper. Correct dustiacket with photo of Churchill at desk facing the

camera. DJ is unclipped, a little darkened on spine, a number of pieces gone along the edges. \$400.00


21 The River War Eyre & Spottiswoode, London, 1949 Fourth printing of this one volume abridged edition first printed in 1933 but using the setting from the 1902 edition. Bound in mustard yellow cloth with gilt titles on spine only. There are 22 maps,

many folding and some in two colours. 381 pages, index, appendices. Book is clean and tight, one corner bumped, heavy foxing on front endpaper, light spots on page edges,

no names. Dustwrapper is correct 1949, unevenly darkened, losses at spine ends to depth of 18 mm, price clipped. \$100.00

22 The River War Eyre & Spottiswoode, London, 1951 Fifth printing of this one volume abridged edition first printed in 1933 but using the setting from the 1902 edition. Bound in mustard yellow cloth with gilt titles on spine only. There are 22 maps, many folding and some in two colours. 381 pages, index, appendices. crisp, clearly never read, cloth unmarked, gilt bright, no names, no spots. Dustwrapper

is very clean, unclipped, good spine color, has a few very tiny edge flaws. \$150.00





The River War Eyre & Spottiswoode, London, 1951 The copyright page states 1951, but this later issue is bound in grey cloth and is believed to be a remainder issue from 1965, based on titles advertised on the dustwrapper. A scarce and bibliographically interesting issue. Book is clean, crisp, unworn. Covers are clean, a small faded spot at head of spine due to gap in the dj. Page edges even, free of spots. Yellow dustjacket is unclipped, good red on spine, yellow of spine very slightly sunned. \$175.00

The River War Scribner's, NY, 1933 Bound exactly like the English edition of 1933 other than Scribner's name on spine and title

page, it appears this American edition was actually produced in England. Cohen reports only 1040 copies printed. Book is crisp and unworn, cloth very clean, contents very clean, seems unread, owner name on endpaper. Dustwrapper is unclipped, spine is toned, but no losses. \$750.00




The River war new edition 1997 (Library of Imperial History)
I produced a limited run of 50, copies in 1997. These were made from unbound sheets of The Collected Works, bound in

black cloth, and stamped in gilt using a die made from the picture of the gunboat on the 1899 first edition. These were printed on 300 year archival paper, a real sewn binding, and top edge gilt. The small run sold out years ago. Although far from the most expensive, this may be the scarcest edition of The River War Fine fresh unused book. \$90.00

27 Savrola (A Tale of the Revolution in Laurania) Longman's Green & Co., New York, 1900, 1st edition.

Churchill's only book length novel, written in 1899,


published in 1900. The American edition was published prior to the English. Bound in dark blue cloth, gilt on cover and spine. 345 pages plus Longmans New York catalogue at rear. Very Good copy, minor wear at spine ends, gilt on spine a little dull, page edges off white. \$850.00



28 Savrola Longman's Green & Co., New York, 1900, 2nd printing The American edition was published prior to the English. The 2nd impression is bound identically to firsts in dark blue cloth, gilt on cover and spine. Clean attractive copy, slight wear at corners, spine has strong color and bright gilt, page tops dusty and light spots, other edges clean, no names or markings. \$400.00

29 Savrola Longman's Green & Co., New York, 1900, 2nd printing. Normally the 2nd impression is bound identically to firsts in dark blue cloth, gilt on cover and spine. But a scarce variant is know in bright red cloth with white titling. Completely unknown to Woods, but see Langworth page 40,

Cohen A3.1.c Binding firm red spine just a little sunned. The white stamping tends to rub off in every copy I have seen, and there is some of that here., no names, contents clean, no spots on edges. \$300.00




Savrola. Longman's Green & Co., London, 1900, 1st edition. 30 medium green cloth, gilt on spine and front cover, 345 pages, black endpapers. Only 1500 copies printed, and the survival rate seems far lower than for Churchill's historical works, making this a scarce and currently undervalued title. Original green cloth is clean, spine same shade, gilt bright. Slight wear at spine ends, some wrinkle in the spine cloth, some rubbing on the joints. Page edges are off white but free of spots. The original black endpapers have some cracks, but still there. Contents show nice white shade of paper, with light occasional foxing. Not fine, but a superior copy of a title usually found with lots of flaws, especially foxing.




Savrola. Longman's Green & Co., London, 1900. The Colonial issue was part of the first edition and uses the same sheets with a modified title page.

Bound like the Colonial Malakand in grey cloth decorated on the cover in dark blue, gilt titles on spine. Endpapers pale green patterned with ship and swan design. These cheap Colonial editions wear poorly and most fell apart in tropical climates, so survival is very low. Considerably scarcer than Home or American firsts. Original binding has clean decorated front cover, but some rubbing in the dark blue areas. The spine is browned, but gilt readable. Original patterned endpapers intact, binding tight, but slight slant. Some scattered foxing in text, light spots on page edges. Far better than most I have seen, but far from fine. \$1000.00



on cheap pulpy paper which goes brown, ads at each end, in illustrated slick paper covers printed red and blue. Size 5.75 x 8.25 inches, 128 pages, with two full page plates on slick paper, making it the first illustrated edition. Part of Newnes "sixpenny novels illustrated" series. A fragile item, low survivability, certainly scarcer than first, but not as Usual worn condition, but the front cover is all there, though with several high value. tears and vertical creases near the left edge. The spine is also complete, some abrasion at



the ends. The rear cover has several tears and has lost a piece about 10 15 mm along its outer edge. The paper is of course tanned, and there is a dark splash on the upper third of the page edges. Lots of flaws, but still far better than most copies. Supplied in custom cloth clamshell box with satin lining. \$400.00

Savrola. Hodder & Stoughton, London, (1915) A cheap reprint published during the First World War. From a series of such books H&S sevenpenny (7d) library. Bound in embossed red cloth, 4.25 x 6.5 inches, 260 pages, frontis plate.


Printed on cheap paper that browns easily. Not scarce, this is an affordable early edition. Binding still firm, covers clean, spine still a good red, as many are faded to almost white. No names, no markings, no foxing,

although paper is browned as usual. Above average example of this cheaply produced edition.\$5000.00

Savrola. Hodder & Stoughton, London, (1915) Cloth covers clean, spine sunned 34 but still red, front hinge broken. This is a variant with 1915 on the title page. See Cohen A3.6.b or Langworth p.45. \$60.00

Savrola Hodder & Stoughton, London, (1915) A cheap reprint published during the First World War. From a series of such books H&S sevenpenny (7d) library. Bound in embossed red cloth, 4.25 x 6.5 inches, 260 pages, frontis plate. Printed on cheap paper that browns easily. Not scarce, this is an affordable early edition. This copy includes the truly scarce illustrated dustwrapper. Book is clean and unworn, with the usual overall brown cast to the paper. The dustwrapper is somewhat faded and soiled on the spine, but the front panel in bright red is superb. In 25 years I have offered only 2 of these rare dustjackets. \$1200.00

Savrola Cedric Chivers, Bath, 1973 This reprint was 37 published for The Library Association and most copies went to Libraries, resulting in a modern rarity. Dark pink cloth, 260 +

xvi pages. Book has unmarked clean exterior, library stamp on copyright page, rear endpaper gone leaving a tape repair. Dustjacket is slightly sunned on spine, some losses at spine ends from wear. \$60.00





despatches sent from the front in South Africa. Bound in coarse red cloth with gilt titles on spine and on cover enclosed by gilt ruled boxes. 496 pages, 3 folding maps, 5 other maps and plans. Top edges gilt. Only 3000 copies published, so far scarcer than English firsts. Red cloth has strong unfaded color, bright gilt, several small white spots on front cover. Binding is tight, nice gilding on top edges, , no spots, no

names, \$750.00


London to Ladysmith via Pretoria 41 Copp, Clark, & Co., Toronto, 1900 First Canadian edition, produced from American plates or sheets, but bound in a similar but not identical style to the English first. A coarser more ochre-brown colour, retaining the


armoured train on cover, but with a red fleur-de-lys on spine instead of the two flags. Far scarcer than English or American firsts. 496 pages, same 8 maps and plans. Issued without catalogue at rear. Original binding features lovely front cover with no marks, slightly darkened, still good red. Binding firm, books seems unread, small bookplate on pastedown, bold owner name on title page. Contents unmarked, no wear, a superior copy. \$500.00

lan Hamilton's March Longmans, Green & Co., London, 1900 The second half of Churchill's Boer War despatches. The First edition. Bound in dark red cloth similar size and style to Malakand but new colour. 409 pages, 32 page publishers catalogue at rear. Frontis portrait of Gen. Ian Hamilton, folding map at rear, 9 other maps and plans in text. 5000 copies published, half that of London to Ladysmith. Original red cloth is very clean, spine unfaded with strong color and bright gilt titles. Faint condensation mark along lower edge of front cover. Original black endpapers intact, binding tight, foxing on page edges and on early pages. Publishers catalogue dated 10/99 bound in at rear. Owner inscription dated Dec 1900 on blank leaf,. Included is a booksellers flyer from Nov. 1900 listing current books including this title. The bright red spine is as good as it gets. \$1500.00



Original cloth has clean covers, a single black smudge on the spine, good spine color, bright gilt, slight wear at spine ends. 46 Ian Hamilton's March Longmans, Green & Co., New York, 1900 The American first edition was bound to match the US Ladysmith. Same 409 pages as English first, but reset so pages are not identical. Only 1533 copies printed, so this is rather scarce. Clean, attractive copy, spine is good strong red with








The Second World War Educational Book Co. Ltd., London, (1954) The Deluxe CHARTWELL edition was published after the completion of the six volume first English editions. It incorporates further revisions, so constitutes the definitive text. A larger book, nearly 7 x 10 inches, printed on quality paper, completely reset, numerous photos in each volume, a two colour title page and colour frontis plate in each volume. The standard binding was bright red canvas cloth, elaborately stamped in gold, with a brown leather embossed portrait on the front and a gilt stamped brown leather title panel on the spine. WINSTON CHURCHILL Library of Imperial History, London, 1974 The Collected Works of Sir Winston Churchill was published by The Library of Imperial History in 1974 in a limited edition of 3000 sets. They were elaborately produced in full white vellum, decorated in 22 ct gold, all edges gilt, marbled endpapers, place markers, in custom dark green slipcases. The full set weighs almost 100 lbs, and takes five feet of shelving. All of Churchill's book length writings were included, many in new reset editions, although some were photoset from earlier editions. The set is 34 volumes, and there are also a further 4 volumes of Collected Essays which bring some sets up to a total of 38 volumes. A fine set in premium condition. Clearly never read, good white vellum, only manor flaws on sslipcases. \$7000.00





194 The Churchill War Papers vol. III The Ever-Widening War 1941. London, Heinemann, 2000. Although not so titled, this is effectively the third part of the Companion to volume VI. lxiv + 1821 pages, maps, detailed index. An important reference, now out of print. This British edition had a far

The Churchill War Papers vol. II Never Surrender May-Dec. 1940. London, Heinemann, 1994. This is the second volume of The war papers which are the companion document volumes to accompany the Official Biography. Although not so titled, this is effectively the second part of the Companion to volume VI. xxxii + 1359 pages, maps, detailed index. An important reference, now out of print. This British edition had a far smaller print run than the US edition from Norton. Book as new, signed by author on title page. \$800.00



199 My Early Life, Ted Heath's copy. Macmillan, London, 1944, Later printing. Bound in navy cloth stamped in gilt. 392 pages, same setting and illustrations as first edition. Retains illustrations of the first edition. Long before he became Prime Minister, Heath served in the Royal Artillery as a AA battery commander in the Second World War. This book bears his ownership inscription on the endpaper E R G Heath, Major RA, on leave Broadstairs August 1945. Book is very clean and unworn, dustwrapper unclipped, slight toning of spine. \$300.00


Lord Randolph Churchill, Ted Heath's copy Odhams Press, London, (1952) This one volume edition contains the full text of the two volume work as originally published in 1906, in a new setting, that is important as it adds a new foreword by the author written for this edition. 840 pages, nine illustrations. Bound in plain red cloth gilt titling on spine. Far less common than other Churchill titles from Odhams. This book signed by former Prime Minister on the free endpaper "Edward Heath" Book is very clean with white even page edges, well rounded spine with bright gilt. 



# **Books signed by Churchill**

The New Examen The Haworth Press, 1934 Most collectors know of 211 only one limited numbered edition signed by Churchill- the set of Marlborough bound in Orange leather and signed by Churchill on a special page. There is however, another signed numbered edition, which is far scarcer. This is The New Examen (B22) of 1934 with a critical introduction by Churchill. Woods describes this special edition on page 162. It is printed on special handmade paper with a distinctive watermark on each leaf. Bound in full orange niger, raised spine bands, top edges gilt, others untrimmed. This is copy No. 33 of 50, of which only 40 were for sale Fine unworn book, even the lower edges of the covers have gilt detailing. \$10000.00

Secret Session Speeches, signed copy Cassell, London, 1946, 1st edition. The Seventh and final volume of 212 the war speeches. Slimmer than the other volumes but same series binding light blue cloth. 96 pages. Signed in blue ink on free endpaper From Winston S. Churchill, 1950. Book is clean, tight, light spots on page edges, endpaper white, gilt bright. Dustwrapper is unclipped, foxed as usual, tanned on spine, minor abrasion at spine ends. \$4000.00



213 Liberalism and the Social Problem. Hodder & Stoughton, London, 1909 First edition of the obscure but important title, consisting of speeches by the young reforming liberal that was pre 1910 Churchill. 5000 copies printed but the survival rate seems far lower than for the earlier tales of travel and adventure. Bound in smooth burgundy cloth, gilt titles on spine, author's signature blocked on cover. 414 pages, no illustrations. Signed Winston S. Churchill on the free endpaper. This is Lord Birkenhead's (F.E. Smith)

copy and bears his armorial bookplate on the pastedown. Book is very crisp with little wear, spine darkened, contents very white and free of spots. This title is one that is rarely seen signed, and for it to be from his great chum F.E.

The World Crisis 6 volumes complete, each inscribed to Charles Hughes London, Thornton Butterworth, 1923-37

An inscribed set of THE WORLD CRISIS, with all six volumes signed by Churchill. I must confess I had to research him, but Charles Evans Hughes, best known as the Chief Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court in the 1930's, was also a presidential candidate in 1916, in a very



close race in which

some papers incorrectly announced Hughes as the winner instead of Wilson. Hughes first met Churchill at the Naval Treaty negotiations, where the Great powers agreed on ratios of warships which each was allowed to build. Hughes was a frequent visitor to Europe throughout his life, but we can only speculate on the exact circumstances in which he met Churchill in April, 1938, the date in the inscriptions in the books. The books are all later printings which would have been in bookshops in 1938, so I would guess that Hughes had some sort of engagement to see Churchill, and bought these books specifically to be signed on that occasion, as none of them appears to have been used or read. The inscriptions in vols. I and II are the same: Inscribed for Charles Hughes by Winston S. Churchill April 1938". Vol. III again on the endpaper has "Inscribed by Winston S. Churchill April 1938" and above that is C. Hughes in a different hand. It also appears that Churchill started to write "inscribed for" and then crossed out "for" and then wrote "by". Vol. IV, V, and VI are the same as III except there is no crossed through word. Vols I-V are Thornton Butterworth later impressions, all fine clean unworn copies with white unspotted edges and bright gilt. Vol. VI (The Unknown War, The Eastern Front) is the Thornton Butterworth Keystone Library edition of 1937, which is bound in a different lighter blue cloth, and has sunning on the spine, but is otherwise clean and unworn. This is a lovely matching set of signed books, and is an unusual opportunity to acquire a set of six volumes all signed by Churchill, and in such outstanding condition. \$24000.00



215 The World Crisis 1911-1918 (Abridged and Revised) Inscribed copy Macmillan, London, 1941 Macmillan bought the rights to several Churchill titles when Thornton Butterworth folded in 1940, and apparently the plates also. There were three

impressions during the war and the setting is identical to the 1930's editions including the folding maps. Thinner wartime paper. Bound in dark blue cloth with gilt titles on spine. First impression of this edition. This book was given to Andre Nikolai Smith, who was the Ministry of Information employee who was the projectionist at Chequers. There is a long letter of provenance in which Mr. Smith relates the types of films Churchill liked, etc. Laid down on the front pastedown is a piece of Prime Minister headed paper with message: Inscribed


for Mr. A.N. Smith by, then Churchill's autograph, then Easter 1942. Books signed during the war years are scarce, as Churchill was normally too busy. Includes further details on Mr. Smith and the purchase of the book. Book very clean and tight, dustwrapper is darkened on spine. \$5000.00

Book is clean, unworn, spine unfaded, gilt amazingly bright. Churchill signature at end of author's preface on p.10. Scare original red on white dustjacket has lost a large ragged piece at head of spine as shown. \$4500.00

Marlborough: His Life and Times Harrap, London, 1933-1938 Signed limited edition. Printed on 217 the first edition plates, with a special verso to the half title of volume I. Bound in full orange morocco by Leighton Straker, 5 raised spine bands, spine blocked gilt with short title, author, vol and year. Front board blocked with same family arms as trade edition. Top edges gilt, other edges untrimmed, with decorative endpapers. One point not mentioned by Woods is that the limited edition is printed on thicker paper, with the sheets of each volume bulking about 1/8 inch thicker. There were 155 sets produced of this special edition produced, and they very seldom come on the market. This is the only limited edition in English of a work by Churchill and the only signed edition. It's rarity and desirability cannot be overstated. Normal editions with Churchill's signature appear regularly at auction. Cohen A97.1.a This is set no. 38. Books are all tight and undamaged. The only wear visible is shelf rubbing along the bottom edges. Covers are clean, spines slightly sunned but still orange, Gilt stamping bright. Top edges clean gilt, untrimmed foredges have the usual spotting. Contents generally clean, some scattered foxing mostly at the plates or maps. These books feel as though never read. \$20000.00

THE COLLECTED WORKS OF SIR WINSTON CHURCHILL, 38 vols. The last and best set ever Library of Imperial History, London, 1974 The whole history of The Collecetd Works is too long to relay. Back in the 1990s, as the sets of sheets ran out and we could make no more sets, I commissioned the binders to make the final



set the best ever. Instead of the usual vellum, it is bound in full green goatskin, with leather inner hinges, and silk moire endpaper inserts. Even the slipcases are special, with leather tops and bottoms and premium bookcloth. As a final touch for the final set, the first volume bears the signatures of the craftsmen at Robert Hartnoll's craft bindery in Bodmin, Cornwall, some of whom had worked on these sets all the way back to the first issues of 1974. There are over 50 sets in circulation bound in red and these have sold for over \$20,000.00 recently. This is the only set bound in green goatskin.
