Notes to Catalogue 153

The large collection first offered in catalogues 145 and 146 has now shrunk considerably, with 175 books having been sold. There are about 200 books remaining and all prices have been reduced, roughly 25% for books under \$500.00 and 10% for books over \$500.00. These are items 21 through 220 in this catalogue.

The first two pages, items 1 through 20, are recent acquisitions. You will note there are 3 different sets of the limited leather bound edition of Marlborough, ranging from \$2000.00 to \$18,000.00. The small description field does not allow for full details, so please ask if interested in these.

The printed catalogue has pictures of limited detail. The download version of the catalogue allows the pics to be expanded for more detail. The online listings at wscbooks.com and www.abeboks.com will have larger photos and in many cases additional photos.

I try to describe the flaws in the books and jackets, and picture the spines of everything. These old pre-1945 books are rarely in perfect condition. If you require perfect, you should consider coming out to Tucson, as I am gradually selling off my Reference Collection.

Any book found to be unsatisfactory may be returned for a full refund or exchange.







This set is is listed as "Presentation" on the limitation page, does have Churchill signature. Two big issues: There are two of vol II, and no vol IV. Vol III binding in poor worn condition. Ask about the set of 4 original covers I have for this set. \$5500.00



2 Amid These Storms

Scribners, NY, 1932, first edition. The American title for Thoughts and Adventures. Less common than the English edition and truly scarce in fine condition. The book iteself is truly fine, with rich unfaded spine, bright gilt, no foxing or spots. The page edges are clean and have that just trimmed, and never read look. The dustjacket has far better than normal red colour on its spine, wear with losses at spine ends and old tape repairs. \$350.00

An exceptional copy. book is crisp and bright, no wear, all page edges even, white and free of spots. Endpapers clean and unmarked. Dustwrapper is very bright, good unfaded red panel on spine, some cracks and wrinkles along edges but no losses, except for price clip. \$75.00

Odhams Press, London, 1939. This set includes the truly rare dustjackets. Books are a deep rich blue shade on the spines with shiny gilt titles. Page tops are blue but darker on vol II which has a 1942 date whereas vol. I is 1939. Both DJs still have the original 8/6 orice on the flaps. The jackets are far from perfect with sunned spines, some losses at spine ends ands some old paper reinforcements along inside of edges that I have made no effort to remove. \$350.00



With such an incredibly small issue, and most sets sold to Libraries, thus has become a minor modern rarity. Book s are clean, tight, unworn, gilt very clear but not shiny as is usually the case. Owner name on each free endpaper. Page tops retain the yellow color, foredges are off-white. NO Djs.. \$250.00

Scribners, NY, 1923-1931. An impressive set, uniformly bound in reddish brown cloth, gilt title on spine and on front cover. Vols 3,4 are first printings, the others later printings. A clean attractive set, with nice shelf appearance., Vol 3 has some wear at base of spine. Vols 4,6 have some condensation marks on covers, Bindings tight. \$500.00

10 London to Ladysmith via Pretoria

Copp, Clark, & Co., Toronto, 1900. First Canadian edition. A superior copy with spine having good bright spine colour, not darkened as most copies I have seen. Front and rear covers look like new with sharp square corners and no wear. Binding is tight with intact original endpapers having no names or markings. Contents very clean with no foxing at all. A careful observation reveals a faint stain of top edges of pages near the spine. \$500.00





Book in very good condition with clean bright covers, unfaded spine, some foxing on edges and scattered within , no names, several folded page corners. \$300.00


Cassell, London, 1941, 1st edition. There were a total of 12 printings, but this copy is the true first. Book is exceptionally clean and tight. The gilt is bright, the covers unmarked, and the page edges and paper a lovely unfoxed white. There is a book Society bookplate on the pastedown. The dustwrapper is unclipped, correct 1st, with very good red spine colour. There are some tiny chips at the spine ends as shown in the photo. Not quite perfect \$350.00





Hodder & Stoughton, London, 1909, 1st edn. . 5000 copies printed but the survival rate seems far lower than for the earlier tales of travel and adventure. Clean with little use or wear. Covers clean, corners sharp, some bubbling of the cloth along front joint. Spine has good color, gilt a little dull. Original endpapers intact, some foxing there, binding still tight. Contents very clean with white paper and no foxing. Foredges white and even, top edges dusty \$900.00





Cassell, London, 1951-52, 1st editions. I had this set bound as part of my reference collection, so opted for all the best features: full green goat, AEG, marbled endpapers, Churchill arms, custom slipcase, etc. Books as new. \$1250.00

Attractive set, some uneven fading on rear cover of vol. I \$2000.00

London, Harrap, 1939, 1st edition. Churchill's two page forward has some interesting thoughts about the Pax Britannica at sea in the 19th Century when the Royal Navy ruled the seas. Navy (of course) cloth, 373 pages, index, photos. Woods B32, Cohen B65. Book is clean, crisp, gilt shiny, signed and dated 1939 by Keyes on endpaper. Dustwrapper is unclipped, all there but very worn and rubbed. \$250.00
